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DISTRICT AND COMMUNITY

Oswego is a suburban community located 50 miles west of Chicago. This rapidly expanding village of approximately 32,000 people is considered part of Chicago's suburban growth. The area is primarily residential, with some light industry. SD 308 encompasses approximately 50,000 residents in the Fox River Valley. In addition to serving the Village of Oswego, the school district serves portions of the communities of Aurora, Joliet, Minooka, Montgomery, Plainfield and Yorkville. SD 308 is the 7th largest school district in Illinois.

Oswego High School

Oswego High School, with a long tradition of excellence, is a four year comprehensive high school with an enrollment of 2790 students. The school is fully accredited by the State Board of Education. Oswego is a member of the Southwest Prairie Conference. Oswego High School uses a Flex 8 Schedule. Class periods are 48 minutes long. Some upper level classes are "flexed" across 2 periods. Students may also earn credits through online learning or dual credit opportunities.

Faculty

The faculty consists of two hundred and ten professional staff members (including administrative staff) with 67% having a Master's degree or above. The pupil-professional ratio is 13 to 1. The average class size is 23.

Academic Recognition

As OHS transitions from the use of Quality Points to determine class rank to the elimination of rank, the Classes of 2018,2019 and 2020 will recognize seniors whose total quality points places them in the top 10% of the class. Additionally, any student who has earned a cumulative gpa of 4.0 and is not in the top 10%, will also be recognized. Ultimately, recognition will transition into a Latin Honors System as follows: students with a cumulative gpa of 4.0 and above will graduate Summa Cum Laude; those with a gpa of 3.8 to 3.99 will graduate Magna Cum Laude; and those with a gpa of 3.6 to 3.79 will graduate Cum Laude.

Approximately 65% of graduates enroll in four-year colleges, 30% enroll in a two year college or vocational school and 1% in the military.
